We like to imagine that low-carbon cities all look the same – 15-minute heavens with people walking & cycling, electric cars humming, and locally produced organic food feeding the masses. Reality is quite different: some cities have airports, others don't; some have coal mines, others boast low-carbon district heating, etc. – available technologies make a huge difference. Have you ever wondered how on earth cities measure their carbon emissions? Unless you live under super surveillance, the city will not know how you spend your money – buying a fancy new phone, wining & dining, driving to work, going on business trips, etc. And you're right: so-called 'scope 3' emissions, stemming from all kinds of consumption, are notoriously difficult to measure – if not overlooked altogether. 

However, logistics companies find it increasingly difficult to operate due to heavy congestion, a lack of parking, and cities' ambitions to get them out. 

Home to the likes of Daimler, Bosch, and Porsche, Stuttgart is one of Europe's most affluent regions. The local automotive industry provides 215,000, or 17%, of the region's jobs. It's a success story, but one increasingly told with discontent. There are genuine fears that the wealth, which the traditional (car) industry generates, cannot be sustained. This would have a devastating impact on jobs, social cohesion, and democratic order. Which is why many people are looking to the past - it was King Wilhem's financial support for technicalentrepreneurial education that spurred Stuttgart's success in the late 19th century - or elsewhere for recipes on how to deal with an uncertain future. Even if money continues to pour generously into research and innovation, copy-paste alone will hardly carry the day in the years to come. And when a cold wind blows, it flexes its muscles; its weight shifts and it leans into the gusts to avoid getting knocked over. D1244 is not a robot from Star Wars but the world's first skyscraper of its kind. Consuming very little construction material, the jaw-dropping building is also a glimpse into the future of architecture.
